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

FROM PAST TO PRESENT

The Progress We Have Made

The Sunbeam organization has changed tremendously over the years. We started with a single location in Kitchener, Ontario in 1956 serving one child with complex medical needs to today having multiple locations, spread over several counties, serviced by 3 separate service divisions that offer a wide variety of supports to the individuals and families within those communities. We are proud of our humble beginnings and stand on the shoulders of the love and care that created the first location in Kitchener. We are equally as proud of being an organization selected by the province, to take on new service areas over the years.

The Community Living division of Sunbeam is the division that most resembles our beginnings. It is the foundation in which we have been able to grow and thrive. The second division of our organization was Developmental Services Resource Centre (DSRC). This division has gone through several iterations over the years, each change better supporting the community and individuals and families. Developmental Services Ontario Central West Region (DSOCWR) is the newest department of Sunbeam. A part of the Developmental Services Ontario system, Sunbeam was selected to serve Waterloo Region and beyond, increasing our service area significantly.

Medical to Biopsychosocial Approach

We began with nursing staff and a medical focus that became the foundation of the health supports we offer today. Now, we adhere to a biopsychosocial approach - we recognize that a person's health is critical for a positive quality of life in every other area and that individuals' psychological and social wellbeing affects their health.

Growth and Expansion

In 1984, we served 126 children in our facility at Kingsway.

Today, we serve approximately 90 children and adults in our residential programs across the region. Our main building no longer serves as a primary residence for anyone. In 1984, we offered parent relief, but did not offer a day program at that time. Approximately 45 people participate regularly in our on-site day program at Kingsway. Finally, our range of services has expanded both in number of staff and types of services offered (e.g. Ontario Autism Program, Coordinated Service Planning, Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder Coordination, Passport Program).

SECTION Proud to Be Your Neighbour

In our earliest efforts to open group homes in the region, we encountered a great deal of resistance. Our program in St. Jacobs met incredible opposition from neighbours and citizens who were concerned about the impact of group homes on property values and what kind of neighbours we might be. Today, we live in a supportive community that believes people with disabilities belong in and are an important contribution to their community.

Treating the total needs of the child requires the talents of a multi-disciplinary team consisting of: nurses, psychologist, social worker, physiotherapist, mental retardation counsellors, speech and occupational therapist, recreationalist, nutritional services, nurse aides and volunteers.

Since then, many of these services have moved to Developmental Services Resource Centre. MORE THAN A CHAIR

As I walked into the seating clinic, which is held monthly at Sunbeam Centre, I witnessed Sheila Buck working with Jude, age 14, to finalize a custom fitting for the seat of his wheelchair. Sheila directed the positioning and molding of the system by gently holding Jude in a proper posture, while the other technicians molded a bag full of Styrofoam beads in around Jude's body. When the proper shape was captured, all the air was removed from the bag to hold the shape.

The appointment had begun with an assessment of Jude's current posture. Sheila determined what could be corrected to optimize his breathing, eating and spinal alignment as he sat in his chair. As the technicians finalized the molding of the chair, Sheila said to Jude's mom, "Can you see, now his head is up and he is looking around more?" We all saw that, and it was thanks to the proper positioning of the custom mold which optimized his seating. Working with seating in this way is really working against gravity - gravity always takes over. When a person sits in a chair for a long period of time without the ability to shift their posture on their own, gravity will push their spine and pelvis into compensatory angles and curves




which compromise their health and sitting posture. The average life span of a wheel chair is 5 years while seating may need to be replaced every two years due to changes in posture or pressure. Other supporting products are walkers, standers, shower seats and commodes.

Jude is one of Sunbeam's shared respite clients. It was suggested by the staff at Sunbeam and Jude's parents that the time was coming for a review of his current wheelchair, as it was showing wear and tear and he was growing out of it. The first stage of the assessment goes to Ibrahim Eblan (Abe), Sunbeam's Complex Care Coordinator who is responsible to identify client needs related to new chairs, and coordinate all the bookings between the clients and the Occupational Therapist here at Sunbeam Centre. He supports the process from start to finish. Abe identified there was a need for Jude to have his current seating looked at and scheduled the appointment with Sheila.

Sheila is an Occupational Therapist and has been actively working in the field of seating and mobility for over 30 years. She provides consultation, assessment and treatment related to seating, mobility, accessibility and ergonomics, through her company Therapy NOW. Sheila has spoken at National and International seating conferences, and has published a book, "More than 4 wheels A Clinical Guide to Seating and Mobility". As well, she has completed training courses in Ontario & Alberta for Occupational Therapists. She also mentors local students. Sunbeam Centre has had the privilege of working with her for the past 19 years.

Shelia shared with me that she feels a sense of satisfaction when the seating system is completed and delivered, knowing it will improve function, comfort and happiness in all activities of daily living that the recipient does moving forward.





We asked Sherry to reflect on her years with us. As you can imagine, many things have changed in Sherry's time at Sunbeam - including her role and responsibilities. It wasn't always easy to adapt to the changes, but teamwork, support, and time made everything accomplishable and manageable.

Dave Otto, currently Director of Finance at Manulife, first became a board member in 1992. When he accepted the position, he was in his 20s and not familiar with Sunbeam Centre or the complexity of the services we provide. In his words, he was "young and naive" - not previously aware of the level of care required for our residents.

Mr. Otto said, "It takes a special person to do this work and we've got some good people at Sunbeam." The specialized, dedicated care that each individual received from Sunbeam Centre employees was inspiring to Mr. Otto. He is most proud of all the group homes he has seen open in his years at Sunbeam Centre, "it's been the greatest feeling - providing a better quality of life and an improved living experience in [Sunbeam group homes].

One of his hopes for Sunbeam Centre is to find additional funding to provide more services for the community at large - primarily, respite care. "People in our community need help and we can't afford to [always] give it to them. There isn't enough space. We want to be able to help parents and caregivers in our community who need this service." 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

HOSPITAL CARE

Every individual, every time, every hour supported – No fear, no confusion. That is our moto or our fundraising campaign for 2018 & 2019. This campaign is to raise awareness and dollars for Sunbeams Hospital Care program. This program has been rolling out over the last few years and this past year we took the steps to make sure it stays in place as the service is extremely necessary. This service has not and is not currently funded.

The Hospital Care Program is to support residents of Sunbeam when they are hospitalized. The program ensures the following:

- > When a resident of Sunbeam Centre is admitted to hospital, staff quickly get in contact with the individual's family to set about identifying if and when family members will be able to be present in the hospital, and what times would be ideal for a Sunbeam staff member to support the individual.
- All of Sunbeam's residents are provided with individualized support during their hospital care. The support will assist with;
 - Communicating and understanding the resident's needs, preferences, personality to the doctors, nurses and PSW

- » Press the button to call for help or assistance when needed. Express pain etc.
- » Support to move around; the majority use the support of wheelchairs, and supportive positioning aids to even lie comfortably/ safely in a bed. They use specific cushioning and wedges to elevate their head or other parts of the body to promote proper breathing, body mechanics etc.
- Help to eliminate stress, outbursts, aggression and other emotions due to the lack of understanding of where they are and what is being done for them
- » Support the quality of care that hospital staff can provide
- Hold their hand, provide a comforting touch

Sunbeam has a vested interest in continuity of care, as a gap can lead to discomfort, and other negative repercussions. Unfamiliar faces and surroundings could lead to anxiety, mistrust, miscommunication, loneliness, and many other emotions.

Sunbeam Centre is determined to ensure that none of the individuals we support, when admitted to hospital, are left only to the care of hospital staff.

It is vital for these individuals to successfully return the time and to cheer her up. Sometimes one or more to health, is that routines remains in place as much as possible, and that the activities they have come to expect during the course of a day can continue. This consistency of care and familiar faces also supports the recovery during hospital stay.

For a Sunbeam Resident, having a familiar face supporting them during a hospital stay is comforting, and lets them know, in a very real way, that they are valued. Knowing that their loved ones are not alone provides peace of mind for families who are not able to be there during hospital stays. Making this area of care a priority is essential for the commitment to care that Sunbeam is determined to deliver always.

OUR HOSPITAL CARE PROGRAM -FUNDRAISING GOAL FOR 2018/2019 IS \$106,000.

Testimonial to how our Hospital Program is making a difference in the lives of our residents. Here is an email received in March 2019 from a family member to our Executive Director; Lisa has been in hospital before when she has been at Sims. It was a time when my wife and I as well as occasionally some relatives would visit to help her pass staff would come to visit her but this was the exception rather than the rule.

Coming full circle to her latest hospitalization and the change in the participation on the part of Sunbeam administration and staff was a revelation to behold. They took complete control of Lisa's admission, her time there as well as her discharge. Many administrators went to visit her in hospital as well as daily visits from the staff of both her home and day

The participation on the part of Sunbeam was certainly a factor in Lisa's positive attitude and her recovery in very trying circumstances. As a parent, I certainly appreciated my time away from visiting her knowing that she had someone whom she trusted and had a very positive relationship with (in essence her family at Sunbeam) was coming to visit it.

Congratulations on conceiving and implementing this program, it makes a tremendous difference in the lives of those living at Sunbeam and the lives of their families.
