Stronger Together Auction exceeds goal!



Tell us a bit about yourself & what led you to this line of work?

News from Sunbeam Developmental Resource Centre—SDRC

Sunbeam Developmental Resource Centre was pleased to host The Honourable Minister Smith, from the Ministry of Children, Community and Social Services, on September 9, 2020 for Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder Awareness Day. He visited our site at Victoria St. as well as our main facility at 2749 Kingsway Drive in Kitchener.

The Honourable Minister Smith announced that the Ontario government is providing an additional \$3 million annually to better support people with FASD living in Ontario. Part of this funding will allow SDRC to hire a second FASD Coordinator to assist families, children, and youth with FASD in the Waterloo Region. SDRC is a division of Sunbeam Community and Developmental Services,

Day Program Update: Beam Up - Sunbeam's Community Outreach Program

The participants of Sunbeam's long-established day program include individuals living with family or in other supportive environments in the community, as well as many individuals who live in Sunbeam's residential group homes. The focus of Sunbeam's Day Program is to develop daily living skills as well as sensory, leisure, social, and recreational skills, by offering a variety of activities, including life skills, community outings, volunteering, educational and learning opportunities, and special events.

Earlier this year, to ensure everyone's safety, our regular Day Program was temporarily put on hold due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This challenge brought out our creativity! Some Day Program staff shifted their focus to providing in-person social and recreational activities and programs within Sunbeam's residential homes, and other staff helped to develop and deliver a "virtual" day program. Using video technology and tablets or computers, the virtual program welcomed individuals to participate from wherever they happened to be, enjoying the variety activities offered, and still feeling connected with friends and staff.

Following government guidelines, with many safety precautions in place, Sunbeam began a graduated re-opening of our regular onsite Day Program in mid-August by welcoming back 6 people. We are pleased to report that several additional small groups have now joined us. We expect this graduated re-opening to extend through the winter and although some aspects of the program are different (smaller groups, wearing of masks, social distancing), the fun, friendships and activities are going strong! The Virtual Day Program option is continuing and expanding for those participants who aren't able to attend in person.









Not to be slowed down by these necessary changes, the Day Program Participants' Council brainstormed with our team earlier this year to develop a new name for the program. The good people at Chatworthy Digital Marketing donated their expertise this summer to create a new logo for the program, highlighting the excitement, diversity and welcoming friendships experienced by our Day Program participants. Thank you for everyone's help coming up with our Day Program's new name "Beam Up - Sunbeam Community Outreach Program". We think the new program logo is very uplifting!

"I have been with Sunbeam for 18 years. I began working at the Tradewinds residential group home while in high school as a placement student. After I completed my Social Service Worker program at college I joined Sunbeam fulltime. The great thing is the staff are not just staff - we are family, friends, and advocates.

In my role as a DSW I wear many hats and perform a variety of tasks. Our group perform various tasks that can include:

- Bathing, feeding and regular hygiene for residents, cleaning and laundry •
- learning, and shopping for all our resident's needs including special occasions

I personally have taken residents to cottages, gone on a 14 hour class trip, and even attended a wedding with a resident so he could be there when his brother got married. My team is always looking for new ideas and googling things that will brighten the lives of our family at Kingsdale."
